## 1. LISTOWEL:

Access is West of the Ballybunion Road (R553) opposite the Lartigue Railway. About one mile of the rail-trail is used as part of the John B. Keane (Sive) walk but you may venture further along the rail track for approximately another mile or so. Alternatively, follow the J.B. Keane route into the bog land and enjoy the bracing Atlantic breeze.

## 2. ABBEYFEALE:

Follow the Athea road (R524) northwards from The Square, Abbeyfeale for 1km. Access is at the 'Railway Bar' and a pleasant walk awaits you. After a short distance the meandering Allaughaun River appears on your right. After 1.5 miles (2.5 km) you will see a finely crafted 19th century bridge overhead the trail. This is called the "Doctors Bridge" and you may exit here if you wish. Just before the bridge, on your left, is a nice 'stepped' water feature.

Continuing along the railway for a further 2 miles we pass the old wayside station at Devon Road. This served a nearby Creamery which has also ceased to exist. A short distance beyond the station the removal of a bridge means that we must briefly (100 metres) walk on the public road before regaining the railway. You now pass through the picturesque Tullig Wood. A further 1.5 miles on you may exit right for Templeglantine village or continue towards Barnagh for another 2.5 miles along an unfinished (Nov.2006) section.

## 4. NEWCASTLE WEST:

Access is adjacent to the Recycling Centre on Station Road (R521). It is an easy walk and the round trip of five miles (8 km) takes 1 – 2 hrs. Along the way there is a river bridge (Daar) and a pleasant tree lined section for 1km at Farran. Ardagh Station Bridge (1867) is the exit / entry point for visiting the village which gave us the famous Ardagh Chalice.

## 3. BARNAGH TUNNEL:

Access is at the N21 Lay-by 4 miles (7km) West of Newcastle West where you will see four interpretative signs. This short 1.25 mile (2km) round trip walk (1/2 to 3/4 hr) provides panoramic views of the Golden Vale and contains a wide selection of flora and fauna. It also contains features of railway heritage including a cut stone bridge, embankment, cutting and tunnel.

## 5. RATHKEALE:

A short 1km (0.6 miles) walk along the old railway parallels the southern side of the N21 at Rathkeale. Exit the N21 at the junction for the R518 and access is to the side of the Palatine Museum (former Station House) [www.irishpalatines.org](http://www.irishpalatines.org). The route includes the railway bridge spanning the River Deel.
